Our u3a in Farnham is an independent charity. We file our own returns to the Charity Commissioners every year and have a very considerable say in how we operate. There are over 1,000 u3as in the UK and nearly 450,000 members. You may know that most the of groups in the majority of other u3as around the country meet in members' houses. This inevitably restricts both the size of groups, and indeed the number of groups. Sitting what traditionally would have been called 'above' us is the u3a Trust, which provides us with advice, guidance and some services. The Trust has recently undergone a reorganisation, intended to improve the communications with and support for local u3as. In general we have very little to do with the Trust but looking at the proposals for the reorganisation we were unable to see that it would make a significant difference to our operations so we voted against it. We were however significantly outvoted so it remains to be seen if the promise of the new organisation is made good. I have recently written to the newly appointed CEO, Iain Cassidy, wishing him well and including a clear statement of what we would consider a success for the new structure. I'll report back; watch this space.

Steve Tilburn, who runs the Marketing team is still in need of one more helper. You don't need any specific skills, just a desire to help and an outgoing nature, not something I've noticed lacking in the membership. It's a couple of hours a week maximum. Can I add the dates for group meetings to my (electronic) calendar?

Group meetings and the monthly and theme meetings can be added to the calendar on your PC, Mac or phone.
