Talking of friends, we all like to think of our u3a as a friendly one but a couple of chats with newish members in the last few weeks have made me think about what this means.

Every year between 100 and 150 new members join us. This number is important as it makes up for the number that, sadly, leave us, either for age related reasons or because they move to be nearer family members. I'm delighted to say that we have, for the first time this year,



recovered our numbers to above pre-Covid levels. This means that about one in ten of us are new. New members join for all sorts of reasons and we don't have a detailed breakdown of the reasons, but experience tells me that a considerable number are new to Farnham and join u3a to meet new people and hopefully to make new friends. It worries me therefore when I hear that some groups are 'closed' and even, in one or two cases 'not very welcoming'. At the group leaders meeting which we will be holding later this month we'll be discussing how to deal with this and with how to ensure that new members are made to feel welcome. My own experience in moving to Farnham six years ago and joining a u3a for the first time could not have been more pleasant (and look where it got me!) So mostly it works, but there are exceptions and I would ask everyone to keep in mind that the older one gets the harder it is to change, and that moving into a new area, perhaps to be nearer family, but knowing quite literally no-one of one's own era is a potentially lifechanging experience, and that we, all of us, have the power to make it a very positive one.



After jumping back into the dating pool, single mother **Bridget Jones** finds herself caught between a younger man and her son's science teacher.



Having won his second Oscar as Best Actor 22 years after his first, Adrien Brody gives a fabulous performance as the visionary architect László Toth, who fled Germany with his wife in 1947 to practice in post war America. **The Brutalist** (in case you are put off by the title - it refers to an architectural style, not a behaviour) is long but it has that old fashioned cinema thing - an intermission! **12th March at 11am, 3pm (subtitled) and 8pm**

One day in 1949, a young Scottish painter climbed a Swiss glacier. The experience rewired her brain, and transformed her art. Winhelmina Barns-Graham was synaesthetic - associating letters, names and people with particular colours - and director Mark Cousins explores how her neurodiversity and her encounter with the glacier shaped her vision of the world. In 'A Sudden Glimpse of Deeper Things' her life is explored in a documentary voiced by Tilda Swinton. Peter Bradshaw of the Guardian called it a "lovingly eccentric ode to a forgotten abstract painter" TUESDAY, 22 April at 11am, 3pm and 8pm.





Peter Sellar's role in **Dr Strangelove** has been re-imagined by Steve Coogan in an **NT Live** stage production beamed to the Maltings on **Thursday, 27th March at 2pm and 7pm**. This explosively funny satire, about a rogue U.S. General who triggers a nuclear attack, is led by a world-renowned creative team including Emmy Award-winner Armando lannucci and Olivier Award-winner Sean Foley. The excellent Riverside restaurant will be doing pre-show dining for many of these events and it's really good!
